3150	Barbara Price	support the plan	<p>My son has done gymnastics for 13 years and he started it as part of an intensive Occupational Therapy programme. He was born with Sensory Processing Disorder, Dyspraxia and Dysgraphia. The SPD was so extreme that it prevented him from being able to eat and enjoy a normal social life. Dyspraxia (body slow to respond) makes school sport difficult and school PE leads to an ideal environment for bullying when a child has SPD or dyspraxia. Ball sports are hard for a Dyspraxic as the delay in response is made worse when you add in having to react to someone else's action. The repetitive nature of learning gymnastic skills, as well as developing the movement and co-ordination assists the brain to strengthen the organisational sequence part of the brain. This has aided my son to function very well in school rather than failing and falling through the gaps. He was Head Boy at Breen's Intermediate and a Yr12 Prefect and Teacher Support Prefect in Yr13 at Burnside High School. While dyspraxic youth usually have difficulty developing sporting skills, Gymnastic has allowed Daniel to develop strength and co-ordination to the point that he is now competing Internationally for New Zealand, finishing 6th in the Japan Junior International Cup on the Vault. He was a finalist in the Burnside High School Sportsman of the Year Awards in Yr12 and Yr13. He has been selected at the University of Canterbury Athlete Development programme and is a 2nd Year Fine Arts Student at UC.</p> <p>I support the granting of the lease to Christchurch School of Gymnastics because</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Without a new gym, Christchurch cannot attract the competition necessary to help our gymnasts to continue to develop. Competitions bring parents and competitors and money into the region. At present we are travelling out of the region regularly to attend other provinces competition as they have the facilities. We will be travelling to Auckland 4 times this year. 2. As is evident from my son, gymnastics is a fantastic sport to allow children with specific learning disability to develop physically and also strengthen areas of thinking which help them cope with school and everyday life. 3. Christchurch School of Gymnastics is the only facility in the South Island where my Son can train safely, but the facilities earthquake damage make that difficult. The uneven floor has temporary boards, and mats to try and even the floor enough for safe landings. The pit has water and other matter come into it when there is heavy rain and so the foam has to be removed before it is damaged. This put the pit out of action for training new landing safely. 4. The three other gymnastics facilities are not set up for training safely at senior level. Olympia Club gymnasts have to come to CSG on Wed and Sundays for training new skills. My son moved from Olympia in Wigram to CSG two years ago due to the roof height being too low for the high Bar and Rings and the lack of pit and floor space making training dangerous 5. For several years, I have spoken to people along with Dael's Occupational Therapist, about the advantage of having children with SPD and Dyspraxia use a gymnastic programme to help with their disability. A larger gym space is needed so there is room to accommodate programmes for these children. The council has just announced free access to council pools for pre-schoolers but my experience with children with SPD is that they will not go into a pool because of being splashed and the smell, noise etc and dyspraxics find learning to swim very difficult. Starting with a gym programme when young to strength the body and reduce the sensory response is needed as the first step for SPD and for dyspraxics, a gym programme strengthening the low muscle message retention is needed. 6. Without a suitable new gymnastics stadium, senior Male gymnasts will need to leave Christchurch and attend Auckland University so they can train at Tristar, Counties or North Harbour gyms in Auckland.

Even the Crusaders have attended several sessions at the club for their own training and conditioning benefit. This would be ideal for other visiting rugby teams (national and/or international) in the future.

CSG also wants to commandeer more car parking which will make it even more difficult for users of the Recreational Centre to find parking when visiting.
