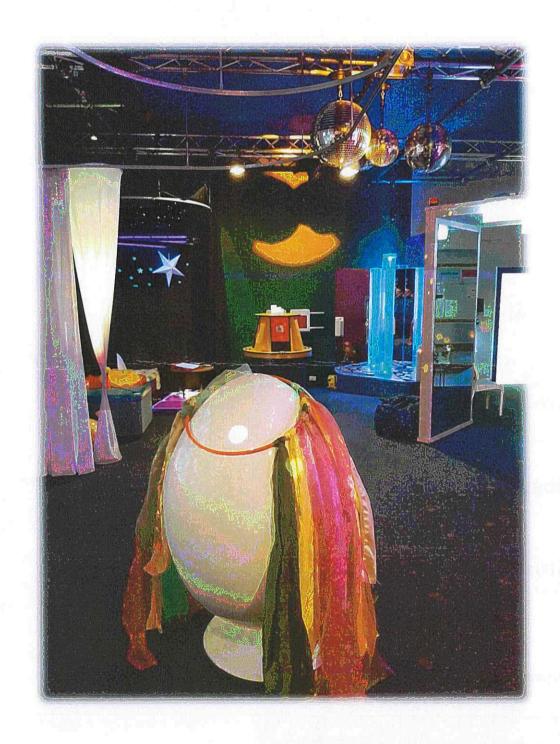

From the Chair

This is the first annual report from the Trust since it was reformed in Nov 2018. A lot has happened in the intervening three years since that first meeting when six new trustees joined Lesley Keast and Brian Reed. While most have now moved on, the addition of new trustees has continued to add diversty, skills and knowledge that have strengthened the board.

While fundraising to purchase specialist multisensory equipment remains a key focus for the Trust, we have also looked to build and enhance our partnership with the Christchchurch City Council (CCC). Key to this has been the development of a new relationship agreement between the Trust and CCC. We have also looked to have a voice in how multisensory spaces are developed and accessed by those with disabilities.

The impact of Covid -19 has been felt across the sector and highlighted the need for boards to be agile and adaptable, especially when it comes to fundraising. Despite these difficulties, I am delighted to report that the Trust has achieved 75% of it's targeted fundraising – in order to purchase multisensory equipment that will feature in the new aquatic multisensory space inside the Parakiore Sports and Receation Centre.

October 2019 saw the unfortunate passing of Lesley Keast. A former city councillor and Deputy Mayor, Lesley was the the driving force behind the Southern Centre and the Southern Centre Trust. In February 2021 the Trust were pleased to acknowledge her efforts by unveiling a plaque in her honour at the Southern Centre. We also took the opportunity to acknowledge and thank Linda Healion, Southen Centre Team Leader, for all of her hard work and support of the Trust over many years.

As we enter 2022 the Trust is entering an exciting new phase. We are currently working on a project to rename and rebrand the Trust as well as developing a website. This will open up new opportunities and enable us to highlight the value and need for multisensory spaces that are accessible for everyone.

In closing, I would like to thank all of the generous funders, staff from the Christchurch City Council, former trustees, and those who have volunteered their time or services. We truly appreciate your efforts and support.

To the current Trustees - thank you for giving up your time and energy to make this work. I have enjoyed working with all of you and look forward to continuing on this journey together in 2022.

Annual Report

Note: the Trust did not hold an AGM in 2020 due to COVID-19. The financial figures in this report are for the periods 1st July 2019 to 30th June 2020 and 1st July 2020 to 30th June 2021.

The Reformed Trust

The Southern Centre Charitable Trust was formed in February 2003 with the support of local Kiwanis clubs, its primary purpose being to raise funds for specialist equipment for a new multisensory room inside QE II Stadium. This room was known as the Southern Centre. After the 2011 Canterbury earthquakes the equipment was moved to the Pioneer Sports and Recreation Centre.

In 2015, Trustees discussed the idea of winding up the Trust and how this could be achieved. While this did not eventuate, the Trust held a final meeting in December 2015 and then effectively went into hiatus. With confirmation of an aquatic multisensory space to be included in the new Metro (Parakiore) Sports and Recreation Centre, the Trust was reformed in November 2018 and six new trustees were appointed. Craig Scott was appointed Chair and Steve Gibling Deputy Chair.

Two of the original Trustees, Lesley Keast and Brian Reed stayed on to oversee this transiton period and a further two trustees were appointed in February 2019. Lesley and Brian both stepped down from the trust in the latter part of 2019, satisfied that the reformed trust was now well established.

Unfortunately Lesley passed away in October 2019. As the previous Trust Chair, she had been the driving force behind the Southern Centre and the Southern Centre Trust. The new Trustees were able to acknowledge her significant contribution by unveiling a plaque and photo in her honour at The Southern Centre in February 2021.



A lot has happened in three years since the Trust was reformed and a summary of the key points and highlights is presented below.

Trust Deed

One of the first tasks for the new Trustees was to update the Trust Deed. This work was supported with legal advice from Mortlock and McCormack. The updated Deed now better reflects the direction of the Southern Centre Trust.

The Trust also reviewed the governance structure by separating the Trust's activities from the ongoing operational work of Christchurch City Council (CCC) staff who run the Southern Centre. The Trust now holds independent meetings and has brought in administration support. The Trust still maintains regular communication with senior council staff, particularly around key strategic issues.

Trust Vision, Purpose and Strategic Plan

A strategic planning session was held in November 2019 where the vision and purpose for the Trust were revisited. Over the course of the next six months and a number of follow up strategic meetings, a new vision and strategic plan were developed. Fundraising remains a key priority for the Trust, however there is now increased emphasis on improving accessibility for those with disabilities and building key relationships across the recreation and disability sectors.

Relationship with Chrictchurch City Council (CCC)

The relationship between the Trust and CCC has been strengthened by updating the former lease and rental agreements. The new relationship agreement is a living document and has been added to over the past 3 years. It clearly sets out the accountabilities and responsibilities for each party and has improved the level of communication, respect and collaboration between the Trust and Council.

Fundraising

A major function of the Trust is fundraising, in order to purchase new, modern multisensory equipment and to replace and repair some of the older equipment used within the Southern Centre. One of the first tasks for the new trust was to replace the outdated computer system in the Southern Centre. This was achieved with the support of the Southern Trust (now Aotearoa Gaming Trust).

In 2020 the fundraising focus switched to purchasing new multisensory equipment that will feature in the aquatic sensory space inside the new Parakiore Sports and Recreation Centre. The Trust has received great support from the following funders and organisatons -

- Rata Foundation a key funder
- The Southern Trust (now Aotearoa Gaming Trust)
- The Blogg Trust
- Kiwanis (Christchurch and North West clubs)
- Christchurch City Council

The coming year

2022 looks to be a big year as the Trust completes fundraising for Parakiore and re-launches with a new name, logo and website. We know that there will be challenges ahead, particularly with the impact of COVID-19, which is likely to be with us for some time. Despite this the trustees are looking ahead to 2022 with enthusiasm and a strong purpose.

We look forward to our ongoing partnership with CCC and continuing to raise awareness of multisensory spaces and the benefits they provide.

Financial Report

Note: Due to COVID-19 the Trust did not hold an AGM in 2020. Included in the appendix are the Trust's audited accounts for the period 1st July 2019 to 30^{th} June 2020. The accounts for the period 1^{st} July 2020 to 30^{th} June 2021 are unaudited.

2019 saw a transition to new Trustees and a broadening of the purposes of the Southern Centre Trust. Great credit to all trustees for their commitment to raising funds that grow our initial purpose. The trust has engaged with the community through hosting events and attending other community events, developing a website and rebranding — (works in progress), supporting the Southern Centre (Pioneer) with new equipment and a computer systems/software update and fundraising for specialist multisensory equipment for Parakiore Sports and Recreation Centre. These events have enabled the trust to help raise awareness and participation of sensory environments, particularly for those with disabilities.

We have received grants from The Southern Trust (now Aotearoa Gaming Trust), Kiwianis, The Blogg Trust and Christchurch City Council.

Note: we also received a substantial grant from the Rata Foundation, which was outside the timeframe for this annual report.

The Trust's bank account (ANZ) is now managed fully online, allowing transparency and accountability of funds. Dual signatories are required on all payments. We intend to open a second, sub-account so we can separate ongoing operational costs from the grants and donations we receive for multisensory equipment.

Identified risks are low cash on hand for the Trust's ongoing administration and operational costs, however the trust is currently applying for an operational grant to cover these costs. There are also the ongoing costs of replacing equipment at The Southern Centre at Pioneer, some of which will need replacing in the very near future. This will require a sound fundraising strategy for the coming year.

For 2022 we are heading into a good financial position to meet our identified fundraising objectives. We have developed a good relationship with a range of grant holders which is encouraging as we raise funds to purchase multisensory equipment that will be installed in the aquatic multisensory space within Parakiore (Metro) Sports and Recreations centre.

Sincere thanks to Brian Reddington and Bennett Reddington Ltd for their continued support with the Trust's GST requirements and auditing of the Trust account.

SOUTHERN CENTRE CHARITABLE TRUST AGM

2020

The Southern Centre started 2020 with a new team, a change in staff roster and an extra session during the week. An exciting way to start the year, including the majority of our regular participants starting after New Year rather than waiting to start towards the end of January.

During this time Marketing also updated the Southern Centre brochures with a fresh new look. The Southern Centre occupancy and numbers were tracking nicely, then Covid came along, placing us all into Lockdown.

In preparation for reopening the Southern Centre, the equipment was cleaned and the room 'fog' sprayed. We also removed the majority of the small pieces of equipment for ease of keeping equipment cleaned between sessions. As the year progressed and we moved down Alert Levels, we saw the return of our regular clients. It also became obvious that not being able to pay by cash due to level two restrictions was a big issue for many of our clients, especially for those in residential care.

This began the journey of installing a scanner in the Southern Centre which would allow participants to pre pay for their sessions onto an entry swipe card. This has proved a very successful installation for all. Participants can either scan at the front counter or in the Southern Centre for those that enter the facility through the back door.

This year saw the installation of a new, highly anticipated computer system. Although the process took a little longer than anticipated, the Team have enjoyed learning the functionality of the new system and the ability to become more creative with the lighting features and switching effects.

Thank you to the Southern Centre Charitable Trust for raising the funds to purchase the new computer system and also to Lindsay Cobb for the many hours spent copying and rewriting the programme to ensure we did not lose any of the room's functionality.

2021

There was a positive start to 2021 with approximately 96% of our regular customers returning. The Southern Centre Team became very creative with the monthly room resets, each choosing a section of the room and this was much appreciated by the participants. There was a high demand for booking slots, especially the morning sessions.

It was agreed by the team that we would introduce a 'Waitlist' for customers who were happy to be contacted at short notice for cancelled bookings. The waitlist has become a valuable tool as it allows the team the opportunity to potentially fill cancelled sessions, and also keeping people connected to the room.

The Southern Centre Charitable Trust wished to celebrate the installation of the new computer system by holding a launch event at the Southern Centre. The Trust also took the opportunity to recognise the contribution that the late Lesley Keast had made to the Southern Centre, over many years. They unveiled a plaque and photo of Lesley which sits proudly in the Southern Centre entrance.

By mid-2021 we had started to see a gradual increase in bookings, not only regular bookings but also casual bookings which overflowed to the weekends. For the first time since the Southern Centre opened at Pioneer in 2012, we experienced a Monday through Sunday - fully booked week in advance. This trend has continued, and whilst the Covid Lockdown had some initial impact it was definitely not as much as the previous year. We are still currently trending up which is against the trend for other programmes/bookings in the Recreation & Sport Facilities spaces.

A survey was completed in conjunction with the Establishment Team and the Aquatic Sensory Experience, with positive feedback received about the Southern Centre. During the July school holidays, in conjunction with Turanga Children's Librarians, we ran a Sensory Storytime, which was well received by those who attended.

LOOKING FORWARD TO 2022

Bookings have been entered for 2022, and with some juggling we have managed to accommodate all requests for sessions next year. The Southern Centre reopens on the 10^{th} January 2022.

We are currently planning two afternoon sessions a week for multi bookings. These sessions will allow multi participants to attend with others that they do not know. There have been requests for open sessions in the Southern Centre especially for the pre-school age group. The sessions are planned for the late afternoon and may be slightly different each month as other bookings are made. The dates and times will be advertised on our website.

What impact Covid will have, we will wait and see.

The Southern Centre are looking forward to another positive year in the room.

2022 -The year ahead

Parakiore Recreation and Sport Centre - Progress Update

The project has hit some great milestones over the last 12-months but the challenges of COVID have resulted in a dip in productivity throughout certain periods of the year. Ōtākaro, the crown agency overseeing the construction project, continue to work with the contractor to manage disruptions but do now expect construction will not be completed until at least a couple of months after the pre-lockdown target of the end of 2022.

Brightening things up, we've seen installation of New Zealand's largest slide activity centre get underway. At over seven metres high and 21 metres long the supplier, New Wave Aquatics, says it's very unusual to have a setup of this size indoors. Specifically designed for toddlers through to pre-teens, this aquatics play area features towering rain leaves, water cannons and a tipping bucket like no other. In total there will be 33 water features and spraying devices on the activity centre and a further 25 water features mounted on the ground around it.

Internal walls and the pool area within the Aquatic Sensory Experience have been formed.

The building is almost fully enclosed with glazing completed around the courts side of the facility, revealing more of the finished look.



Work also continues on the agautic sensory space that will feature inside Parakiore.

Research

The Southern Centre Trustees are excited by the prospect of further university level research into users experiences of multisensory spaces, particularly for those with a disability. This reserch will have increased relevance when the water based multisensory room opens inside the new Parakiore Sports and Recreation Centre, adding to the land based multisensory room already established at Pioneer Sports and Recreation Centre.

Taking the lead on this work for The Southern Centre Trust is Dr Hilda Mulligan, who joined the Trust in April 2021. She brings a wealth of knowledge on teaching and research from her work at the School of Physiotherapy, Otago University where she had a focus on enabling disabled people to gain life enhancing experiences through participation in community environments. She could see a 'fit' between her research and the Southern Centre Trust's values of striving for participation for all through continual improvement of interactive multisensory spaces. She also envisaged the possibility of using her research and community networks to enhance and develop the work of the Trust and its partnering with the Christchurch City Council towards multisensory spaces and places in Canterbury.

In the first instance (2021) Hilda used this opportunity to arrange with colleague Dr Meredith Perry (Otago University) for a small group of four undergraduate students to complete a structured literature review to investigate the space (environment, size, location), equipment preferences (type and frequency), and outcomes of multisensory spaces for people/whānau (carers) with dementia. This piece of research is now complete and will be 'published' on the Trust's new webpage for public perusal, and with a link to the City Council's Multisensory/recreational webpage.

For 2022, there is an opportunity to expand the Trust's research portfolio, via engaging Professor Leigh Hale, Dr Ally Calder and Dr Meredith Perry as supervisors for 3 Honours research projects. These are more substantial projects than what was undertaken this year, will require ethical approval to be conducted and will require and enable collaboration with Christchurch City Council Recreation staff with tertiary students. They should result in information for the Council to use immediately in development and maintenance of its multisensory space/s, whilst also extending tertiary students to understand how community places and spaces are designed, developed and made to be inclusive for all.

The intent of the 3 projects is to investigate/capture -

- i) the demographics and preferences of current users of the multisensory room at the Pioneer Sports and Recreation Centre, via a survey over 4-6 weeks.
- ii) the experiences of adult users (and their carers where appropriate)
- iii) the experiences of child users and their whanau.

Projects ii and iii would entail interviews with study participants.

Rebranding and Website development

With the impending arrival of the aquatic based multi sensory room the Trust decided the time was right to look at renaming the Trust and developing a standalone identity. This will help reduce the ongoing confusion with the Southern Centre.

Modern Design were engaged to undertake this project inconjunction with the Trust. When finished, the Trust will have a new name, logo and website. The website will contain links to the Christchuch City Council website and specifically the two multisensory spaces at Pioneer and Parakiore.

The website will feature a donation function that will allow people to donate directly to the Trust. It will also include web pages with information on research, equipment and other multisensory spaces, here in New Zealand and overseas.

AUDITOR'S REPORT

Opinion

I have audited the Financial and Service Statements of **The Southern Centre Charitable Trust**, a Charitable Trust and registered Charity, for the year ended 30 June 2020. These statements include the Statement of Financial Performance, Statement of Financial Position, Statement of Cash Flows, Statement of Service Performance and the Notes.

In my opinion the Financial and Service Statements provide a true and fair view of the financial activities of **The Southern Centre Charitable Trust** for the year ended 30 June 2020 and their financial position at that date, in accordance with the financial reporting framework for registered Charities. The activities disclosed in the Statement of Service Performance provide a fair representation of those activities.

My audit was completed on 5 February 2021 and my opinion is expressed as at that date.

Basis for Opinion

I have been guided by New Zealand auditing standards ISA(NZ) in performing this audit in as much as they are applicable to small not-for-profit entities. The auditor's responsibilities with respect to such audits can be accessed here:

An audit involves collecting and examining evidence that the information presented in the Financial and Service Statement correctly represents the actual financial activities and position of the organisation to a high degree of certainty and accuracy. This also means that the information given in the Statements must be complete with no significant omissions that may mislead the reader of the Statements.

Note that the requirement of completeness does not extend to the Statement of Service Performance, and my assurance in respect of this Statement is limited to the fair representation of information given there and does not contain an acknowledgment that this information represents all significant activities of the organisation.

1. STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Reporting entity

The Southern Centre Charitable Trust is registered under the Charitable Trusts Act 1957 and is registered with the Charities Commission under the Charities Act 2005. This performance report is a general purpose performance report which has been prepared in accordance with New Zealand generally accepted accounting practice.

Basis of preparation

The Southern Centre Charitable Trust has elected to apply PBE SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For-Profit) on the basis that is does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses of equal to or less than \$2,000,000. All transaction in the Performance Report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate in the foreseeable future.

Specific accounting policies

The following specific accounting policies which materially affect the measurement of financial performance and financial position have been applied:

a) Revenue recognition

Grants are recognised in the year they are used for expenditure on their specific purpose.

Fundraising income is recognised once the event has been completed.

b) Property, Plant and Equipment

Items of property, plant and equipment are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is calculated on a diminishing value basis to allocate the cost over its useful life. Property, plant and equipment depreciation rates - 26.4 % to 48 % DV.

c) Taxation

The Trust is a charitable organisation registered under the Charities Act 2005 on 30 June 2008 (Registration Number CC30114) and is therefore exempt from income tax. The Trust is registered for GST.

d) Goods and services tax

Goods and services tax has been treated in the performance report on an exclusive basis, except for the statement of cashflows which has been shown inclusive of GST.

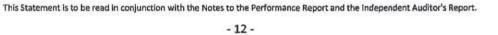

1. STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Reporting entity

The Southern Centre Charitable Trust is registered under the Charitable Trusts Act 1957 and is registered with the Charities Commission under the Charities Act 2005. This performance report is a general purpose performance report which has been prepared in accordance with New Zealand generally accepted accounting practice.

Basis of preparation

The Southern Centre Charitable Trust has elected to apply PBE SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For-Profit) on the basis that is does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses of equal to or less than \$2,000,000. All transaction in the Performance Report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate in the foreseeable future.

Specific accounting policies

The following specific accounting policies which materially affect the measurement of financial performance and financial position have been applied:

a) Revenue recognition

Grants are recognised in the year they are used for expenditure on their specific purpose.

Fundraising income is recognised once the event has been completed.

b) Property, Plant and Equipment

Items of property, plant and equipment are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is calculated on a diminishing value basis to allocate the cost over its useful life. Property, plant and equipment depreciation rates - 26.4 % to 48 % DV.

c) Taxation

The Trust is a charitable organisation registered under the Charities Act 2005 on 30 June 2008 (Registration Number CC30114) and is therefore exempt from income tax. The Trust is registered for GST.

d) Goods and services tax

Goods and services tax has been treated in the performance report on an exclusive basis, except for the statement of cashflows which has been shown inclusive of GST.
